## *Staying In Touch*

With everything that is increasingly being revealed about the long-standing pattern of child sexual abuse within the Catholic priesthood, I think it is appropriate for me to make some remarks.

The issues here are two: the nature of pedophilia and the nature of power.

Pedophiles are ill and become masters at cover-up and deceit. Fear and reward and confusion about what is going on, help the behavior stay hidden. Pedophiles can be straight or gay, although proportionate to the relative numbers in the population, a larger percentage are straight. This tragedy being uncovered has little to do with the sexual orientation of the predators. Likewise, I do not believe that pedophilia is caused by the priestly vows of celibacy. Breaking one's vows by having sex with another adult, although still prone to power issues, is another matter altogether. To advocate for the abolishment of celibacy in the priesthood as a solution to the rampant pedophilia, would be a smokescreen to be sure. Likewise, saying that homosexuality is the problem, is a distraction that plays on cultural homophobia.

In any abusive sexual behavior, power is the main issue...power over another human being. It is my opinion that the less open and democratic any system is, the easier it is for abusive sexual behavior to be practiced without discovery or censure. People are less likely to question things. People like children, and others traditionally at the bottom of the hierarchy are more vulnerable. Likewise, In a more traditional religious setting, where people are asked to receive their salvation through a "more perfect" priesthood who negotiates their relationship with God, a dynamic is set up that obviates against speaking up or challenging, or feeling that one has the right to disagree.

I am not criticizing the Catholic Church and its beliefs. I am stating what I think are systemic cultures that attract pedophiles.

I have heard that the Catholic Church has issued a "no tolerance" policy toward sex with children. While this is a start, it is not enough to say that a priest who is discovered to be a pedophile will be fired, or even arrested. Practices have to be initiated at every level of church life that protect children from these things happening at all. At First Parish we have a "Safe Congregations Policy". Among other things it includes:

- No child, or group of children, is ever left alone with one adult. There are always two adults present.
- Every classroom has a glass window in it to insure that there is open visual access to the activities therein.
- Every church member who teaches must be willing to undergo a "CORI" check which insures they have not been arrested for sex crimes.
- Our sexuality curriculum, 'Our Whole Lives', teaches respect for others and empowers young people to neither accept nor practice relationships that are coercive in any way.

When a child is abused sexually, their life going forward is usually quite difficult, sometimes tragically marred. Pedophilia is a societal issue that every group in society must guard against. I wanted you to know that we are doing this at First Parish.

### Vision 20-20 Team Update

The Vision 20-20 Team has been busy gathering information and stories, and learning as much as we possibly can about what makes First Parish such a special place for so many people. We have held a series of listening circles, met with several committees, taken a survey of the congregation, and spoken to people outside First Parish about their impressions of our community. We also had a well-attended and engaging potluck dinner event in January, during which we presented some of our preliminary results and key themes.

Through our initial data gathering phase, we have identified eight core “themes” that are consistently mentioned as critically important to First Parish. This does not mean that there is universal agreement on the details within each theme (for example, while “Music” has emerged as a theme of major importance, there are some at First Parish who love traditional hymns most of all, and some people who

prefer not to have too much “church music”.) In fact, in almost all cases, there is great diversity of opinion within each of the eight key areas.

In no particular order, the key themes are:

- Diversity
- Children and Youth
- Financial Stability
- Community Service and Social Action
- Spirituality and Ritual
- Fellowship
- Growth and Membership
- Music

In addition to our core themes, we have discovered some other very interesting things about our First Parish community! For example, according to our non-scientifically-validated survey, approximately 58% of our members have pet cats at home, and 46% spent time on YouTube.com in the past month!

The next step for the Vision 20-20 Team is to continue synthesizing the information, and to begin developing “Provocative Proposals” regarding First Parish’s vision of our desired future. We will be meeting with members of the Mass Bay District leadership team to review our process and preliminary ideas, and also meeting with the Board of As-

sessors to discuss these ideas in depth. You can all look forward to the opportunity to respond and give input to these "Provocative Proposals" as we develop them over the next few months!
